## JOINT VENTURE COMMITTEE CHAIRPERSON NAMED

Richard Good, of Portobello, has been co-opted to chair the Joint Venture Committee investigating the feasibility of building a combined community centre and boating club on the boating club site at Broad Bay.

Under the memorandum of understanding agreed to by the two organisations, an independent chairperson is required for the committee, which comprises four representatives from each organisation.

A union organiser with the Post Primary Teachers' Association in Dunedin, Richard has lived in Portobello for 28 years. He is married to Ana and they have three children, all of whom went to Broad Bay School. From 1989 to 1995, Richard was treasurer of the Broad Bay School Board of Trustees. He is currently chairperson of the Dunedin South Labour Electorate Committee.

At its meeting on 8 November, the Joint Venture Committee decided to set itself up as an incorporated society under the name "Broad Bay Inc", which will give it the status necessary to apply for funding for a feasibility study. This study, which will look at the design, construction, resource consenting and financing of a new complex on the boat club site, is expected to be carried out next year.

The findings of the feasibility study will be reported back to the parent organisations. The organisations will then decide separately whether the project will go ahead. Before that stage, however, there will be progress reports in the Broad Bay community newsletter and direct reporting to the management committee of each of the parent organisations.

The Joint Venture Committee believes that consultation with the Broad Bay community at large will be an important part of the project.

The BBCC's representatives on the committee are Roger Belton, Ian Booth, Neville Peat and Jason Bevin (alternate) and the Boating Club is represented by Allan Potter, Brian Loughrey, Brent Patterson and Ruth Seeney (alternate).

## **Community Board Update**

The elected Otago Peninsula Community Board members are Irene Scurr, Chairperson; John Bellamy, Deputy Chairperson; John Bezett (Ward Councillor) Bill Allen, Christine Garey, Natalie Karaitiana and Lox Kellas.

On a personal level it was great thrill to have so many representatives from Broad Bay at the "swearing in" ceremony on 1 November. Thank you to all who took the time out of their busy schedules to attend - you made it specially meaningful for me to take the oath in your presence. Of particular note at that meeting was the statement by our Chairperson, Irene Scurr, that because of the hard work of the Board over the past two terms this Board, has the opportunity to be visionary in its decisions. There wass agreement that we want be a Communit Board with vision

### **Nuts & Bolts**

Meetings are held alternately at the Otaru Room, Civic Centre and the Portobello Aquarium. Members of the public are welcome to attend and if you have a matter you wish to speak about in the Public Forum at the start of the meeting, you need to give adequate notice well before the meeting. Items for the agenda eg grant applications, need to be lodged several weeks before the next meeting with Jennifer Lapham (the Board's Governance officer) at the DCC. Give her a call on 477 4000 and discuss the timeframe with her. The Community Board has a \$10,000 Project Fund each year for local projects and the funding year is midyear to midyear. If you belong to a Peninsula organisation that has a project it is planning and that needs some financial assistance - that is what the Project Fund was set up to support, providing the project meets certain criteria. That information and grant application forms can be obtained from Jennifer Lapham at the DCC.

#### News

A thorough and impressive presentation was given in the Public Forum section of our first meeting on 21 November by Alison Ballance, a STOP representative and Neville Peat asking the Community Board for it's "support, enthusiasm and leadership for a proposal that the DCC purchase the Harbour Cone to Peggy's Hill farm". As a result, your Board unanimously voted to ask the DCC to consider this proposal urgently. This proposal was spoken of as a "once in lifetime opportunity" that has presented itself and the need to act quickly as the land is already on the open market. We will await the outcome of the DCC's decision with great interest - a wonderful opportunity to do something remarkable for the future

The other exciting development is the progressing of the Portobello jetty development through initial Council processes. The reclamation of an area of the harbour and development of that to provide a new jetty, boat ramp with manoevring and reversing room and a 'footprint' for both the boat club and coast guard facilities at Portobello, is the option which has been recommended to Council's January Annual Plan meeting.

While these two items were the significant ones discussed, your Board continues to keep a watching brief on roading

#### STOP News

Environment Court Case: By the time you read this the Appeal that STOP is taking against the DCC granting a non complying subdivision on the Highcliff Rd will be over. The Ministry for the Environment has granted legal aid and members have been generous in their donations, but a small amount more money is likely to be required to meet our obligations.

Harbour Cone is up for sale and STOP is leading a campaign to persuade the DCC to purchase the block (which starts at the end of Bacon St, goes up to Larnach Castle, over the top of Harbour Cone and across to the Lime Kilns and partway down to Hoopers Inlet) as a Recreational Reserve. The alternative is for it to be sold as separate titles that will, under the District Plan allow between 11 and 21 houses to be built. The Recreational Reserve on the other hand would have potential for walkways, cycleways, picnic spots, safe viewing point off Highcliff Rd, protecting native wildlife and enhancing native bush as well as widening Highcliff Rd at its most dangerous point and retaining the rural aspect and outstanding landscape views. If you consider this is what you would prefer, please contact the Mayor and city councillors to tell them of your support.

## The Broad Bay Hall - a short history.

By 1905 there was much community feeling in Broad Bay that there was a need for a community meeting place, for possible clubs and groups, and for church services. Mr David Bacon had sectioned off some of his land to form the township of Margate; he gave a piece to the community to build a hall. This was allotment 4, on the corner of Lower Portobello Rd and Bay View Rd, which became Hall Rd, then Moerangi St. The hall was built and officially opened in 1906,

at the cost of 160 pounds. In April 1907 the 'Broad Bay Hall Society' was formed. Since it was not a registered society, the title to the land and hall had to be taken in the name of 3 trustees. The first were John Clearwater, farmer, Thomas Wellbourn, 'labourer', and Charles Wilkie, retired farmer. The trusteeship began officially in 1921, being handed down to members of these families, or to other elected members. The final trustees were James Beattie Black, farmer, Ivan Cassell Brown, blacksmith, and Ledestan Hone Taylor, welder, in 1947. In 1949, the Hall, the land, and all the assets were transferred to a new body, the Broad Bay Community Centre (Inc)

The Board of Trustees held the land and premises for the Society, which was responsible for usage, finance and maintenance. The Hall was finally lined in 1929, an extra room was added in 1933, and the anteroom (toilets etc) was lined in 1934. Much of the money raised was through the efforts of the Women's Institute, who would hold bazaars and 'entertainments'. The Bay grew, with the consequent growth in the number of groups wanting to use the Hall. The groups were invited to have members on the Committee - the WI appointed three members, and immediately Mrs Perriman was

made the Secretary. She served until her death in 1948. Other

groups joined the Committee, including the Boating Club, the Broad Bay Social Club, and the local branch of the Red Cross. By 1945 it was obvious the Hall was inadequate for the growing number of clubs. In mid-1946 a deputation of groups to the Hall Committee introduced the idea of enlarging the Hall (cost about 600 pounds), or building a new hall. In November 1946 there were serious deliberations about the state of the piles and underfloor bearers. In December 1948 the local Catholic congregation 'relinquished use of the hall'; the writing was on the wall for the Hall Society. In February 1949 it moved: 'that the Hall be transferred to the Community Trust and that the Hall Society be wound up'.

The Broad Bay Community Centre (Inc) had already bought two sections in the Bay. Ten local men had each paid 10 pounds to purchase the sections, and these foundation members drew up the original constitution and rules. The first section was a strip between the Lower Portobello Rd and the Speight property, which extended from 'Marine Parade' (now Waikana St). It had been bought in 1913 by a local settler, John McLeod, and almost immediately transferred over to Charles Speight. The second was a strip of flat land which adjoined the first, extending in from now Clearwater St originally bought by Charles Speight . The sloping section became the Speight berry garden, the flat section was the Speight family tennis court. Both sections were transferred to the BBCC on 1st October 1946, the BBCC taking out a mortgage. Since the Society had insufficient members to develop the land (only 52), it was held in reserve for 'future projects'.

Taking over the original Hall brought problems for the BBCC, culminating in 1952, when the Hall was declared unsafe because the foundations had deteriorated so much. Much fundraising was started, and by October 1953, over 500 pounds was used in the repairs. Volunteers gave hours of labour, both in repairing the foundations and refurbishing the inside. The reopening function on Saturday 3 October 1953 saw the foundations completely restored, but much left to do inside. At this time the BBCC committee was: Mr DJ Fleming (President), VG Robinson, JL Wilson, AE Williams, GW Mason (Secretary/Treasurer), GM Lumsden, CH Williams, GH Mason, the Rev RC Grover, Misses M Muir, V Bishop and R Perriman.

The final entry in the Hall Society Minute Book reads: 'Broad Bay Hall burnt down, Midnight Feb 22 1954, total loss.' There is debate about the precise date, but it was burnt down in 1954.


Over the next months the BBCC committee approached the Peninsula County Council, requesting the Council 'meet the Broad Bay community needs'. The Bay was 'desperate' to get a hall, especially to hold dances for the young people, keeping them in the district, and also ensuring their parents knew where they were. The PCC agreed to hold a poll in the Bay on the matter, but there were delays. And even if the poll result were to be positive, it would be the responsibility of the Centre to submit plans for approval. At this stage, the Hall was to be built in concrete bricks, incorporate a Plunket room, and another room suitable for meetings, and there was a 500 pound subsidy available. The Committee approached LF Knewstubb and Son, builders in Dunedin, soon after the Hall had been burnt down, and they suggested a sum of about 5250

pounds to build a new hall, which would include all concrete work and steel trusses, and cover about 80x40 feet.

The Committee then approached Allingham architects in Dunedin, plans were drawn up incorporating a Hall area, and extra rooms at the back, including a kitchen.

Pressure built on the BBCC committee to have a meeting area in the Bay. The costs, especially of fulfilling the Allingham plans, were seen as too great, especially given the difficulties of raising a large mortgage. And there was some unwillingness to raise a lot of money through fundraising. Consequently, the cheapest building possible was erected after 4 months work in 1957 on the flat section, the Speight tennis courts. It was opened by local MP, JG Barnes, on 8th June 1957. The nucleus of the finance was the insurance from the old Hall, a grant from the Department of Internal Affairs, accumulated fundraising, and 700 pounds raised 1955-57 (including a large concert held in the Coronation Hall in Portobello in 1946). Again, volunteer labour featured. The Hall was finished at 50x30 feet, with other rooms and a kitchen. It was of timber framing, a hardboard exterior, polite (asbestos mixture) exterior cladding and an iron roof, cost approximately 3000 pounds. The President at the time, Mr KW Baird, was happy that the Bay groups now had somewhere to meet, especially youth groups. The opening was followed by a bring-and-buy sale and a dance for young people in the evening.

However, the quick and cheap option created much controversy at the time, and some of the original 10 foundation members shook their heads and walked away, considering an opportunity had been lost to create a large, modern community asset. The Centre is now the only private, community-owned hall in the Dunedin area
