#### **STOP News**

Save The Otago Peninsula (more commonly known by our acronym, STOP) has been very busy of late. Winter is planting time and we have had two projects on the Harbour Cone Block – one near Peggys Hill on the high road, and the other at Smiths Creek at the end of Bacon St. Just over 500 native plants have gone in to further enhance the Smiths Creek revegetation project which aims to ensure that whitebait continue to thrive in this creek. Of these, the Broad Bay School provided about 100 plants that they had grown on with the assistance of the Yellow-eyed Penguin Trust Nursery at Company Bay and our thanks go to the Honda Fund and the Bendigo Valley Foundation for

Honda Fund and the Bendigo Valley Foundation for enabling us to purchase the rest.

As well as native plants, some fruit trees are being planted around the picnic area thanks to the participants on the Sustainability Course that was recently held in Macandrew Bay.

A group of volunteers meets at the moment every Tuesday on site any time between 9am and midday to plant, peg down weedmats, and get rid of the large broom and gorse remaining. Work for all capabilities. Come for just one hour or two if that suits. New volunteers warmly welcomed, especially as two of our regulars head north for a few weeks.

Two other volunteer groups meet on Thursday mornings to work on the Portobello Creek and a Scientific Reserve near Broad Bay. Again there is a range of work for all capabilities. The latter often has transport available from town if you know anyone that would like to come out.

Meetings are held in the Etheridge Rooms behind the Community Centre at 7.30pm on the first Tuesday of every month. All welcome.

This is the time of year when the pest plant, Darwins barberry, with its mass of bright orange flowers becomes obvious. Please remove it from your gardens or roadsides so that it does not spread into native bush where it suppresses and replaces native seedlings.

I cannot see where they have done this, as they have been so neat. They are a credit not only to their parents but also to their school for bringing them up to demonstrate such delightful community awareness and respect, qualities that are increasingly rare. These are children who live interactively in the living world and are not glued to the computer screen. Please support them by publishing this in your next newsleter to encourage others to invest in their fund-raising efforts, which includes an Open Garden experience on 21st September.

### **Otago Peninsula Community Board**

Our assertion that the Otago Peninsula Community Board is a highly functioning community board, is not only borne out by its accomplishments since its inception but again this morning in a discussion with a sitting councillor around the weight the Board's view has carried with Council. It was also heartening to have community members attend our last meeting from different parts of the Peninsula to congratulate us on the results we have achieved in the past three years. But there can always be improvement......

One of the challenges of the next triennium is to ensure that the funding the Board has already secured for the Portobello/ Harington Point Road Improvements Project (often referred to as the Peninsula Cycleway), is *not* dropped by Council.

The key to this is two fold – firstly understanding the facts around the project and secondly, the Board needs to present a united front to Council (no matter what personal differences/views members may have on the detail).

So the facts .....

First and foremost this is a *safety* improvement project – that is determined by the funding formulae. For the Board this has always been about the residents first - children walking safely to school in the main settlements, residents being able to walk and cycle safely as well as it being safer for vehicles. The social wellbeing benefits are clear for all to see at Macandrew Bay. The improvements are of notable benefit for our visitors too who find the narrow parts of the road road very challenging .The recreational and commuter cycling is a huge winner from the improvements and their safety is paramount too. However, the funding model is all around it being a safety improvement, not about it being only a cycleway.

We are delighted that the Otago Peninsula was named one of the top ten cycling destinations in the world in 2010 by the Lonely Planet Guide and we know there is great potential for tourism opportunities that will come out of a safe cycleway around the harbour edge and with a ferry service to link them. However, we have a way to go - only 40 % of the widening has been completed to date but the rest is within our sights.

There is an exceptional team of council staff who have the expertise and latest research behind them to advise and carry this project through - we are indebted to them for their hard work thus far. They are committed to seeing this through but in the end it is in the hands of the elected representatives. The Peninsula community and its Board need to keep delivering the consistent message to Council that this **Portobello/Harington Point Rd Improvement Project needs to be** *completed* and before other projects are started!

With the latest research in cycling available and against a backdrop of fiscal constraint, the Board was asked recently to vote on several options regarding shared or separated pathways for cyclists and pedestrians. After reviewing the relevant research and the feedback we had received from the community, we opted unanimously for a separated path with a low physical barrier between cyclists and pedestrians as well as a low physical barrier between cyclists and vehicles. This is for the next stages with the recommendation that the sections that have already been

completed, are changed to this design within the current footprint of those sections as soon as is practicable.

Another important point not well understood, is that two thirds of the money for these improvements comes from the NZ Transport Agency (NZTA) and their formulae are complex. Securing support from DCC has always been vital to ensuring we get this NZTA funding – without one we don't get the other and so the Board has worked closely with staff throughout and especially at Annual Plan time to ensure we are well informed and present accordingly.

And so the second key point for the next Board will be to ensure they are up to speed with this project and present a united front to Council to continue the momentum. There may be differences amongst members on detail but consensus should be the goal in the end, as the moment there is a divided Board, we risk the possibility of losing the funding.

Which brings me to the next point. The challenge for the new Board will be to ensure that all areas of the Board constituency are represented. Previously we have had a spread of board members from all over the Peninsula. However, at this election most of the candidates are from one area and while that level of interest is great, whomever is elected will need to find a way to represent all constituents and to work together to achieve the best for all of the Otago Peninsula; continuing the focus of balancing the needs of residents and visitors.

And speaking of residents – thank you from DCC staff for your patience re the lights on Portobello Rd by Moerangi St – there was a bit of a delay in getting car sensing lights which mean less delay but I believe they are in place now. A lot of work is going on behind the scenes to find a long term solution in terms of a repair for that section of road but we may have a while to wait yet.

I wish the new Board well. Until after the election I am unsure what, if any role I might have to represent you. What I can say is that it has been a privilege to work on your behalf and I am proud of our achievements; of the difference we have made to our community through the work we have done. I have enjoyed working under John Bellamy's leadership and with the rest of the Board and I thank them for their hard work and collegiality. We haven't always agreed on everything but we have worked very well together and always in the best interests of the Peninsula community. I wish those retiring, a well deserved rest and to the new Board - all the very best for the challenges ahead!

### Walkway/cycleway extensions An opinion piece

I am strongly in favour of extended and safer walking/cycleways on the Otago Peninsula, often walking for instance on the dangerous section between Turnbulls Bay and Portobello, as well as through Broad Bay. I would also be more likely to walk more often from Broad Bay through to Raynbird Bay if it was safer. To this end, Ian and I made a successful request to the DCC that in the section below Mc Farmers Backpackers they tarseal between the road and the rock wall where stones from behind the rock wall had been dislodged by high tides, thus making it impossible to walk off the road. (Unfortunately for some reason, they did it only for part of the way and did not continue it to Pineapple Rock, so one is still walking on uneven ground or forced to walk on the road, moving off to stand stationary when vehicles pass.)

I am however not so convinced about the necessity for a Macandrew Bay highway style walkway/cycleway, along the full length of the harbour edge, and especially if it means reclaiming an even wider area needed to provide non-shared pathways.

As a member of the Ornithological Society, which carried out monthly surveys of the birdlife on the harbour edge for two years, I became acutely aware of the importance of the already vastly reduced intertidal zone and the rocky foreshore for the bird life we love to watch, but may be taking for granted, such as white faced herons, oystercatchers, ducks, gulls and shags. I'm also very aware of the importance of the shallows for spawning fish and the exchange of the galaxids and others that make up whitebait – and of course provide food for other animals further up the food chain.

If the total walkway/cycleway is extended as currently planned we will lose a further almost 7 hectares of intertidal zone. Most walking and cycling (especially children's cycling,) will continue to be done close to the main settlements and there are likely to be only the occasional walker between suburbs. If I am walking those sections, I am prepared to share with the occasional cyclist.

As well, **all** of the historic stone walls, many attractive geological formations, and most of the few remaining trees on the seaward side will have been buried and or obliterated (Detouring round them increases the loss of intertidal zone.)



The picture on the right is not the featureless highway that I personally want all the way from town. I am personally prepared to lose national funding from the NZ Transport Agency and opt for cheaper ways of providing walking and cycling routes if it means it protects the environment, the historical landmarks and the landscape.

Once the reclamation has been done and the walking cycling highways are in place we cannot turn back the clock. Maybe we need to be looking at funding for a scenic walkway/cycleway?
