A construction update from Fulton Hogan:

Fulton Hogan has been back at work on the Peninsula Connection project since early January.

At Section 8 (Turnbulls Bay to Portobello), work on replacing the Bacon Street culvert is near completion. Thank you for your patience during water shut downs, these were required to place the water services into a temporary location at the culvert site, and they have now been placed into their final location. The new pump station at Seaton Road is well progressed and raising of the other pump stations is about to commence. Also, further sections of road are being prepared for sealing. Over the coming months you will also notice new seats and plantings being installed throughout this section.

At Section 2 (Burns Point to Rosehill Road) bulk fill and new stone wall has been constructed along nearly one kilometre of this section from the Rosehill Road end. A boardwalk and retaining walls will also be constructed here.

We wish to thank the Otago Peninsula community for your ongoing patience and support during these works, and for travelling slowly through our worksites.

Well 2019 is well upon us, the kids are back to school, parents back to work and normality has hopefully set in. I hope you all had a great Xmas and New Year. I must say I loved working New Years Eve and popping into all of the wonderful gatherings around the peninsula. Thank you all for your hospitality that night and for everyone's responsible attitude towards the festivities.

With school back in session it is time for a friendly reminder about speed around our schools and making sure we are parking appropriately and not placing ourselves and our tamariki in danger. For the wee dots please make sure they are buckled into an approved car seat or booster. We will be running a plunket day in the next few months educating on the correct way to install these seats. You would be amazed how many of us get it wrong. This will be an educational day, we will not be dishing out infringements. If you see something that you believe requires police intervention on our roads you can call *555 to report it. You will be asked for the nature of the complaint, what type of vehicle it is, where it is, registration number and what direction it is travelling. All of this information is crucial in the police being able to identify and deal with the driver involved appropriately.

Road Safety is paramount and we all need to do our bit to ensure we get to where we are going safely. Speed still is an issue around the roadworks. If it says 30kmph or 50kmph please adhere to this. These signs are here for a reason and we need to keep the workers and other road users safe. Give yourself an extra 15 minutes to get where you need to be.

Crime over the holiday period has been down on last year. There was a burglary in Harwood where some electronics were stolen. There has been an increase of boy racers types out this way. There have been four thefts from vehicles at Okia Reserve and Seal Point Road. Tourists are targeted. I can confirm we have identified a solid suspect and enquiries are continuing. If you see anything suspicious please make sure you call it in.

Finally and of a concerning note it has been brought to my attention that there has been an unusual amount of cats going missing in Harwood. I am not jumping to conclusions but the amount to me does not appear to be a coincidence. I certainly hope no one is taking matters into their own hands in respect of these cats. I think you know what I am saying. Animal cruelty is abhorrent and will not be tolerated. There are severe penalties for such actions and the SPCA have been notified. If anyone is caught doing the unthinkable then I can assure you action WILL be taken. If your cat has mysteriously disappeared in recent weeks please contact me so I can get a full picture of what may be happening.

Two weeks ago a pounamu necklace was found at the Portobello domain. It has a black string and a distinctive angle cut at the bottom of the stone. If you have or know who has lost this please contact me.

We hope you have enjoyed boating over the holiday break. There is plenty of warm weather still to come for water activities.

On 6 December 2019 the Coastguard vessel towed the Russian rower Fedor Konyukhov to the Heads as he began his rowing journey to Cape Horn. His official starting point was between The Mole and Taiaoroa Head Lighthouse. Fedor is just over 2 months into his journey and about half way to his destination. He relies on the tide and the wind to help him along and he has sometimes gone around in circles or even backwards which would be most frustrating. He has been in some very unfavourable conditions but his row boat

The annual **Coastguard Old4New programme** was held at Reid Marine in Dunedin in January. The local volunteers went along to help the National Coastguard team with this. The programme started 5 years ago with the intention of getting as many poor life jackets out of the community as possible. Old lifejackets were replaced with new ones at a reduced price. In the 56 locations visited around



New Zealand over the present Summer, 1,500 life jackets were replaced.

Coastguard raffle - we had a great response at Bunnings on the Saturday before Christmas and the remainder were sold at Mitre 10 on the Sunday. One of the prize boats was also on display. Thanks to everyone who helped with this.

The Coastguard vessel has been moored alongside the Broad Bay wharf over the Summer. This has proved most helpful for our weekly exercises. We have some new members in training at present. If you are keen to join then check out the Dunedin Coastguard website.

News from the Otago Peninsula Community Board

We've had some terrific weather and everyone has had a good break and holidays, but we're all back to work and school again for the new year. Its timely to remind everyone to be vigilant and safe on the road around school starting and finishing.

Peninsula Connection - Portobello Road – Work has progressed significantly since the last newsletter and I'm pleased to say that people have been patient and understanding while the work is underway. We continue to look on track for the completion of the April completion of the Portobello – Broad Bay Section.

Harington Point Road – I met with Council staff last week to look at alterations to the layout of the widening sections, especially the current placement of the concrete barriers. I hope that we can get this fixed as I know they currently make the road too narrow. I'll update everyone on this very soon.

Wellers Rock – Te Umu Kuri – The use of the area for boat launching and the inevitable parking issues have been problematic for this area for some time. I'm pleased to say that the City Council have initiated a working party of the Board and community to look at what the options are to make improvements in the accessibility, parking and launching are for this area.

Otago Regional Council Bus Changes – Congratulations to the community over the changes to the bus services for Bayfield and Tahuna kids. The sensible thing was finally done for those pupils, but it came after months of lobbying the Otago Regional Council.

However, I'm disappointed that we could not make the same improvements for the Harwood and Harington Point families who are reliant on the bus service. I want to take this issue back to the Regional Council and in the Annual Plan process and also as the much-vaunted hub project is underway. Please feel free to contact me so we can co-ordinate our efforts in bringing about further changes. Remember, this year is an election year.

Annual Plan 2019 – The City Council proposes a 5% increase in rates this year and we are likely to see a 3% increase in other fees and charges this year. Its very likely that you will see a total increase in rates of around 45% over the next 9 years! For everyone who owns or rents a property that is going to hurt in some way in the future.

I urge every citizen to engage with the Annual Plan Process and have your say on any of the issues that are raised in the plan. This is only a small part of your time and will become available in coming months.

The Board's Submission to date – I presented to Councillors last week some initial thoughts on the needs of the Peninsula Community. These included:

- Drainage, footpaths and roading infrastructure
- Rubbish, recycling, and toilet upgrades to cope with tourism
- Continued support for pest plant, animal control and biodiversity
- Roading maintenance and upgrades
- Track and recreational management, (including playgrounds).
- Completion of the Tomahawk School issues

I will have a second opportunity to present further items in a few months. **If you have anything you'd like to raise, or an issue or project you think should be highlighted** please let me know over the next month.

Royal Albatross Centre.

How's the albatross viewing? 22 chicks have hatched so far – and more coming as you read this! We've three nests in view of our observatory - viewing has been great. We're working via our Givealittle Page to raise \$4000 to support DOC with extra Irrigation, equipment, water and squid to help the albatross through a challenging chick raising season -we're the people hoping the weather is cool this month, it's not great for the birds. Watch the live albatross Royalcam for more action.

Blue Penguins Pukekura.

We've been having good viewing, adults are just starting their moult and chicks are still fledging. We've been feeding penguin chicks as part of our kaitiaki responsibilities. 60 chicks in total were fed at some point with 11-12 still being fed daily. We are very grateful to our penguin scientist Dr Hiltrun Ratz and her troupe of volunteers who help with this!

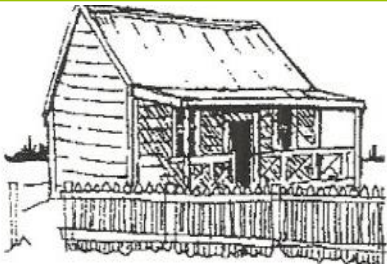

Our Tuesday working bees are underway again as it suits people. The men have got the forge section sorted which looks great.

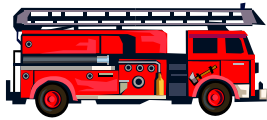

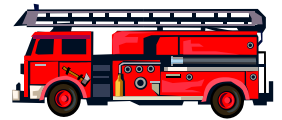
Some early photos from our files show the Andersons Bay causeway and the railway line to Andersons Bay

In the end the Directors felt that there was insufficient support from Peninsula settlers in buying shares to assist the Company to build the line

Delays in an emergency can be devastating

If a fire breaks out, many rural property owners face an increased risk due to their remote location and the distance from the nearest fire brigade. Even when we arrive our response can be compromised by our fire appliance not being able to gain access onto driveways due to overhanging branches or narrow gates and fence lines. There are also issues with no clear pathways to water resources on properties.

In an emergency its critical our fire appliance and crew can get to you as soon as possible. Please ensure your mailbox number or Rapid number is clearly displayed.

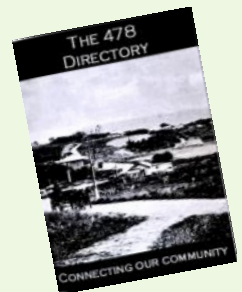

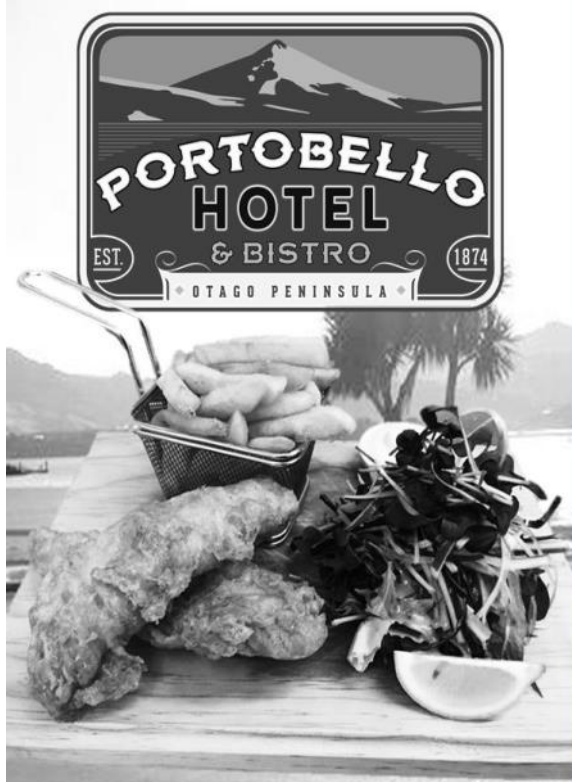

We are really excited about this year's programme on the Otago Peninsula. With over 17,000 possums removed from the peninsula we are witnessing the biodiversity benefits and positive outcomes.

This year we will be undertaking community engagement in Portobello to rekindle connections with the view to bring the community together to help achieve the possum eradication goals. We aim to increase backyard monitoring, trapping and reporting in the community so that collaboratively we can reach the goal of becoming a predator free peninsula by 2023.

Off the Beaten Track – Track Clearing Volunteer Days

At this point in our programme it is essential that our track networks are kept clear so we can undertake monitoring to identify where the last possums are hiding out. This is where volunteer help is needed! Dunedin Market Report

2018 Market Report Preview

2018 was best summarised as a year where supply of property continued to fall well behind demand. This put continual pressure on the median sale price which rose 12% over the year, and median days to sell remained consistent around 23 days. This demand was mainly fuelled by low interest rates which saw many first home buyers entering the property market, and others taking the opportunity to upgrade their homes.

2019 & The Year Ahead

Changes to the tenancy laws and the looming deadline for upgraded insulation and heating has seen some investors take advantage of the strong market and quit some of their older more maintenance prone homes. There has been no shortage of first home

buyers keen to snap these up and put the work into improving their own home. As a result of this however, Dunedin is facing a major shortage of available rental properties making this an ideal time for other investors to buy into the market.

With upcoming major projects like the new Hospital build, we expect this shortage to be a real challenge for our local market, and will no doubt put further upward pressure on property values. The council has adopted the new 2GP district plan, and although at the time of writing this report it is still going through its open appeal period, the council are working between the old plan and the new plan when making resource consent decisions. The key points of the new plan are: a relaxing of zoning on land around the city fringe to create more urban development. This was preferred to further expansion of Mosgiel due to a lack of infrastructure in that location, and further challenges with flood plains and drainage on The Taieri Plains. Developing the fringe of the city around areas like Corstophine, Brighton, Halfway Bush and North East Valley makes provision of public transport and other amenities more feasible.



Students and staff at Portobello school returned to school on January 29th for another exciting year of learning. We welcomed a number of new students and their families to our school on the first day of the year which was exciting for everybody. We have a busy term ahead planned and look forward to a wide variety of learning opportunities inside and outside the classroom.

Our first big school event for the year is a trip to Quarantine Island. Junior students will spend the day on the island and take part in a number of different activities. Senior students will also stay the night on the island. Excitement is building for this trip which will happen in mid February. In March our school will head to Otakou Marae for an overnight Noho Marae experience. A school assembly will be held at the end of our stay at the Marae which will be great. We are looking forward to this experience.

On Saturday February 16th we are holding our Spud in a Bucket Harvest day. Many members of our community purchased a bucket and spud in Term 4 and have been busy growing spuds since. From midday on Saturday 16th we will be judging the success of the spud growing when families bring their buckets back to be emptied. Competitions will also be held for the best dressed bucket, best carved potato and best potato dish. A sausage sizzle and a raffle will also be sold onsite. Come along and join in the fun. It was a great day last year and we expect this year will be just as good if not better!

During Term One all children are participating in twice weekly swimming sessions at our school pool. We are so lucky to have great pool onsite and we use this pool throughout the term in Terms One and Four. Many members of our community purchased season keys this season and make use of the pool outside school hours. Season keys can be purchased from the Portobello Shop. A number of children have signed up to represent our school in the Dunedin Futsal and Ripa Rugby competitions.

A large group of students in our school are interested in joining the Enviro Group which will meet weekly to undertake environmental projects around our school and community. Year 7 and 8 students have completed surveys about what they are interested in learning about in our local and wider community and we will now begin organising the 2019 7,8..9 programme which provides our senior students with opportunities to extend and develop skills, introduce opportunities and further develop strengths and interests.

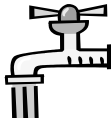

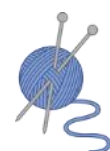
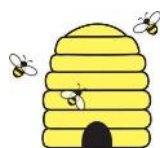
