plantings in the lower part of the Smiths Creek Catchment (where STOP has been creating a "future forest") now mean some easy walking and great dog walking within the fenced revegetation area. Entry is through the first gate off the Bacon St track. Keep an eye out for ripening fruit in the Community Orchard (between the two main bridges) which produced apples last year for the first time.

STOP has regular volunteer working bees on Tuesday, Thursday and Sunday starting at 9.30am. Two to three and a half hours duration. (On Tuesday and Sunday meet at the far end of Bacon St in Turnbulls Bay.) Activities include planting and maintenance of seedlings, weed control and track maintenance. Currently there is some boardwalk and step construction work using funds donated by Calder Stewart. Bring your dog if you like.

Fitness required – you need to be able to walk across an uneven paddock. Tasks tailored to your level. If you can garden then you can assist. Gloves and all **tools** and **morning tea** provided. **Transport subsidy** for students and pensioners coming from beyond Broad Bay (bus or car).

The last part of the route for the **Hereweka Hike on Saturday 29 February** (after the free BBQ sausage at the Larnach Model Farm) will pass through part of the revegetation area at Smiths Creek, for which STOP is responsible. Currently available are runner beans, lettuces, courgettes (green and yellow), yellow dwarf beans, silverbeet (quick, it's going to seed) — or check the blackboard. All that is needed to be part of the Community Garden is do some weeding or other garden activity (we're always looking for people to mow the grass occassionally), and that qualifies you to harvest. If the harvesting comes first and the work later, that's okay too. You are welcome to join us for our monthly **working bees: Saturday 14 March from 3.30-4.30pm** is our next one. BROAD BAY SCHOOL: Kia ora and Happy New Year from the little school with a big heart! Our water safety program is all set to run again this term, building on the huge success of last year's pilot program. Researchers from the University of Otago emphasise the importance of teaching water safety skills in open water, as we can't assume that skills learnt in a swimming pool will generalise to natural settings. Our students and parents greatly enjoy our beach sessions, which strengthen not only children's water safety skills, but also their connection with the natural environment, which in turn promotes health and wellbeing and the importance of our roles as kaitiaki of our local environment.

We're delighted that Fran Bolgar has taken on the role of school gardener, and will lead students' involvement in the Garden to Table program. This program sees children enthusiastically getting their hands dirty and learning how to grow, harvest, prepare and share fresh, seasonal food.

In early March our staff will visit Ōtākou Marae, where they will connect with 20 other schools and 150 teachers from around Dunedin to learn about the history of Ōtākou.

Korero Cafe, our community initiative, is now being held on Tuesday mornings, 9:00-10:30am in Room 4. We welcome community members of all ages to come along, enjoy a good coffee, and each other's company. We have toys for little ones, and comfy chairs for those of us who are a bit older! Perhaps you're a current parent and want to have a catch-up? Our Principal, Greg, will be there each week to have a chat and make you a tea or coffee. All welcome!!

WILD DUNEDIN FESTIVAL 17 – 23 April There's a lot happening on the Peninsula during this year's Wild Dunedin festival with events for all ages during the April school holidays 17–23 April. This year there's a focus on rewilding. Save the date Monday 20 April 6.30pm when **Post Possum . . . Yeah, Right!** will be held at the Coronation Hall in Portobello. This event will feature celebrated broadcaster Alison Ballance (a former Portobello resident), local wildlife photographer Rod Morris, and other experts discussing planting natives and predator control leading to the reintroduction of wildlife such as South Island Robins to the Peninsula.

The always popular Wild Food Dinner will be held at Glenfalloch; Wild Food Webs and Fishy Feasts; a Seaweed Workshop at the Marine Studies Centre; and you can catch the Port to Port Ferry from Portobello to Quarantine Island for their Rewilding Open Day.

Larnach Castle is running a Native Plant Detective activity throughout the school holidays, with prizes, and free entry for children. The Royal Albatross Centre is putting on express tours at a bargain price; Blue Penguins Pukekura will have excellent family deals; and Penguin Place and Monarch Wildlife Cruises are offering discounts for their tours. This is a great time to visit these local wildlife attractions, when tourism is winding down.

Many other wild activities will be available at Orokonui Ecosanctuary, Sinclair Wetland, Otago Museum, Toitū, Tomahawk Lagoon, Ribbonwood Nursery, Huriawa Peninsula, NHNZ, Dunedin Public Library and the Art Gallery. OTAGO PENINSULA BIODIVERSITY GROUP: Seasons Greetings. 2020 may be the year of the rat, but we plan to make it a difficult one for possums! At this time of year possums will be eating blackberry, orchard fruits, grasses, fungi and crunchy critters, like insects and snails. If you notice that a possum is eating fruit from your garden please report a possum at <u>possums@opbg.nz</u> or through the OPBG website (<u>predatorfreepeninsula.nz</u>) and we'll help you catch it.

Recently OPBG has concentrated possum control on the outer Peninsula between Papanui and Hoopers Inlets. Bait stations were placed in these areas in December and later filled with toxic bait. Bait the possums hadn't eaten was removed in early February. Trampling of tracks by volunteers at Sandymount in October last year and track clearing in February has kept tracks from growing over. The volunteer Guardians Group has now caught over 300 possums near Dunedin. They're doing a great job preventing possums from moving back onto the Peninsula.

Possum control efforts are mostly occurring on the outer Peninsula at present, before we roll possum control back along the Peninsula through Portobello, Broad Bay and Macandrew Bays. Nevertheless, if you have a possum in your back yard, please contact us and we will hopefully make it one less possum we would have to deal with later.

William Bacon and family of Broad Bay: Obituary for William in the Otago Witness 1891.

One of our ancient landmarks has just disappeared in the person of Mr W. Bacon, carried away by that dire scourge the influenza at the ripe age of 87. William came out from London with his wife, 2 sons and a daughter on the ship Nourmahal in 1858. Soon after his arrival he bought land in Broad Bay and with the help of his sons made a comfortable home, working early and late at sawing timber, splitting shingles and bush clearing. He took an active role in local matters and was the first to hold Sunday services in Broad Bay. William is buried in the Northern Cemetery along with his wife and 3 girls aged 2 weeks, 2 years and 15 years. His sons John and David were the founders of the livery stable business in Dunedin.

Until his death William lived in his residence Ivy Lodge, Broad Bay and later his son John Bacon lived there. The other son David, lived at his residence The Crescent in Broad Bay. Both these men lived into their late 80s. David and John are buried in the Broad Bay Cemetery

OTAGO PENINSULA COMMUNITY BOARD NEWS: Work on the Peninsula Connection continues with the Broad Bay to Company Bay section being started on 17 February with one lane traffic from the Company Bay end. The Turnbulls Bay wall stabilisation is scheduled to finish early March. From now until early April there will be at least two sets of traffic lights between Glenfalloch and Vauxhall and one set between Broad Bay and Company Bay. Fulton Hogan and their site staff will be prioritising Peninsula – City traffic during the early morning and the opposite late afternoon where ever possible, plus public transport to improve wait times.

2020 Annual Plan: submissions to the Council on behalf of the community were made in January on the first round. The focus has been on better roads, footpaths and public facilities. The Board will be running a series of meetings with the community from now until the end of March to hear more about what you want in the Broad Bay area and on the Peninsula. We've all had to accommodate the disruption caused by the road works but overwhelmingly the Peninsula community has been patient, and courteous. I'm especially proud of the great kindness shown to the workers, some of whom are far from home. Locals have delivered baking, cards etc to them (take a bow, Lois Paterson).
