News from the Otago Peninsula Community Board

Tau Hou hari, Happy New Year. It seems a long time ago since we said goodbye to 2020 and welcomed in 2021. Like most people in the community, I'm quite glad to see the back of 2020. Let's hope that we can move forward in a positive way this year and regain some of the business and community ground that we lost.

Peninsula Connection – Work on Portobello Road at Broad Bay continues and contractors will be starting on the reserve and Grieg Street sections

late this week. It will see a dramatic change to the area, but there are plans in place to ensure it is improved for the community. I still don't have any word on the Portobello Township timeline but will keep everyone posted when I have any information.

Community Plans and DCC Long Term Plan – If you've been following the deliberations of the City Council recently, you'll know by now that the Council plans a <u>9.8% increase in rates this year</u>. I wrote about this last time and its worth repeating once again, 2021 is going to be a very important Long-Term Plan for the Dunedin City Council. With the City Council now working towards the 2021-2031 Long Term the Community Board must have a clear picture on what the Peninsula Community's priorities are.

It's too easy for the community to allow the Board to act and speak for them, when actually Board's need vocal people to support them. If we all don't actively participate in this process, we may miss out on seeing our community needs met or worse.

Board Meeting & Funding Applications – The Community Board is to meet on Thursday February 18th at the Portobello Bowling Club. Just a reminder that we still have funding for community projects and welcome people to the meetings and public forum. VOLUNTEERS NEEDED FOR SUNDAY ROSTER

Over the years, the people of Otago Peninsula have established the Otago Museum and Historical Society and filled it with treasures from the past. A dedicated and active committee looks after the extensive collection and continues to develop it. The Museum is staffed by volunteers and opens to the public for three hours on Sunday afternoons from 1.30 p.m.

I have volunteered on a Sunday afternoon for a couple of years now and really look forward to my turn. It is great to have the opportunity to support the preservation of our local history, especially with such a fantastic collection as the one here. People come to this Museum from New Zealand and around the world, some researching information about their ancestors who lived in the area, some to reminisce about objects they see that remind them of their past, and some just to appreciate the artifacts that the museum has on display.

Sunday afternoon volunteers are rostered on for two turns per year, so even if you work full time or lead a very busy life, it is quite manageable. You don't need to have lived here all your life, and you don't need extensive knowledge of the history of the Peninsula - although If you are interested, there are some really good books at the Museum that you can read, and an excellent collection of photographs and other documents.

Do you recognise any of the people in this old photo? Do you know where this stone cottage was located? If you can help us with identification please email the Museum or phone Laurel on 4780 512 In the December Museum News we wrote about Walter Riddell who lived at Ivy Bank on the top corner of Highcliff Road and Sandymount Road. The Museum has a copy of a Diary kept by Walter with occasional entries from 1865 until 1871. (The original is in the McNabb Collection at the Dunedin Public Library).

We have taken some excerpts from his Diary which gives us an indication of just how tough life was on the Peninsula in those days.

The family had arrived in Otago in 1862 on the ship 'Grassmere'.

28 March 1865 - Set out from Dunedin on the morning of Tuesday 28 March, arrived safely and paid the carter £3 for carrying us and our luggage and livestock (seven fowls) to our new house that we called Ivy Bank. It took us ten days to cart our things through the bush.

15 April 1865 - *Have been busy sawing timber all week and excavating for addition to our house which consists of one room 14 ft by 12 ft built of fern tree. Brought 1 ton of potatoes which took 4 days to carry through the bush.*

29 December 1865 - Another year is wound up amidst difficulties and debts but how thankful ought I to be, for the health I enjoy and the work I have got.

1 January 1866 - *I am entering another year with £83 in debt on my head with plenty of hard work before me. I have increased in the year that has passed a house, an acre of land cleared, 15 hens, 2 cows and a son.*

(Over the years 1865 till 1871 Walter Riddell cleared bush, planted crops, built houses for many local settlers, built the Pukehiki Church and Manse and several more children were born).

4 January 1868 - Paid sawyers for cutting timber for Church (Pukehiki) £26, got on the roof the last day of the old year. Was invited to spend the day with John Mathieson of "Springfield" and so the year 1867 closes on us still labouring for daily bread and hard up for money, still we have improved our position since last year. Father has been bad with his breath for a good while now. Spent New Years Day at Mathiesons dancing and making a fool of ourselves. Wasted a good day and felt tired next day when I had to turn out for work.

(Walters father, William, died in November 1870 at Ivy Bank, although it was not mentioned in his diary.) (His brother Willie got into bad debt in Dunedin and Walter was forced to help out - as he mentions below.)

15 August 1868 - Went into Dunedin to make arrangements for a mortgage on my property of $\pounds 150$ in order to meet promissory notes signed by me for my brother Willie. I am very sorry at doing it, it sent a pang to my heart, but I hope by the good name of God upon helping me I will be able to clear it off again in a short time.

3 January 1869 - Thus began a new year. On a survey of the year that is past I have been rather unlucky in my worldly affairs. I have run my head into debt for nothing, lost a cow and got hard up in money matters. Although however, the obligation on the other hand has not been small, I have one child more and have been blessed with good health and soundness of mind.

30 April 1870 - Started to build my own house, fixed the piles and started to dig out foundations. (The house was completed at the end of June)

7 January 1871 - Another year has arrived and I am still in existence. lonely and single handed to battle with the toil of getting bread for my family. Things are a great deal lower this year than ever they were, still hard up for money. We have 8 cows this year and can't keep going.

14 January 1871 - Started to saw for Larnach's house this week. Awful hard and ugly timber, have 32,000 ft to cut.

(Over the next 10 years Riddell worked on the Larnach house and out buildings

Portobello Library:

The Library, in the Coronation Hall, is open **Thursdays** 11-1 and **Sundays** 11-1. The Sunday opening is just new but we are really pleased with the number of people who are coming along. New members pay \$5 to join then no charge after that except for 20 cents each book you take out. Our Librarian, Dot, has purchased lots of new books and if there is anything you are keen to see in the Library then have a talk to her. Lorene is our Sunday Librarian.

We have our Annual General Meeting coming up and we would like a couple of new members. You don't have to do anything as we only have one meeting a year (the AGM) but we always need enough to make a quorum so take note of the date and come along.



Quarantine Island Kamau Taurua Community News

Over the past few months we've had quite a few visitors, both on day trips or for an overnight island get-away, a celebration or holiday. There has been very mixed weather, but all have enjoyed this special place, having fun, swimming, kayaking, walking, or resting and recharging in the company of others and connecting to place. Visitors included students from Otago Polytechnic's summer programme for young people from former refugee backgrounds. Thanks to our volunteers, the students got to try a variety of activities, from learning some Te reo and weaving with harakeke, to watering seedlings and kayaking. Other visitors have assisted with watering and releasing seedlings, weed control and checking tracking tunnels as part of our biodiversity project.

We have had a new hot water cylinder installed in the Lodge thanks to **Graham Innes**, electrician, and **Richard Geels**, plumber, and QIKT Community member **Chris Brown**. Thanks to funding from the **Otago Community Trust** which enabled us to purchase the cylinder.

We held a relaxed and informal Te reo workshop, led by QIKTC member Joe Hunter, and we look forward to hosting more of these this year.

Many thanks to **Port-To-Port Cruises and Wildlife Tours** and **East Coast Charters** who provide our boat transfers to and from the island.

We still have a number of volunteer opportunities currently to assist us with releasing and watering seedlings, weed control, and also leading groups in February and March for school groups visits. Let us know if you might be interested. Training will be provided. Keep an eye on our Facebook page and website for updates on events.

If you'd like to be a regular volunteer, or either visit or stay on the island, as a family group, or group of friends, or for a retreat or workshop venue, see our website <u>quarantineisland.org.nz</u>.

Otago Peninsula Biodiversity Group

Despite all the challenges of 2020, possum control was most successful and possum OTAGO PENINSULA numbers on the northern areas of the peninsula are now very low. Our goal to June BODIVERSIT 2021 is to establish and maintain a network of traps on northern areas of the peninsula to catch the remaining possums and demonstrate that possums have been eradicated from these areas. Operations will then switch to the eradication of possums from the rest of the peninsula.



NEW ZEALAND MADE

Over February and March possums will be busy consuming Karaka, Mahoe, Rata flowers and leaves, and Miro berries. Orchard fruits are also on the menu, as is blackberry, rose hips, grass, fungi and crunchy critters, like insects and snails. Young possums (joeys) will be leaving their mothers and moving about to establish their own territories, which may well be in your back yard. If you notice that a possum is eating your fruit or roses please report it at possums@opbg.nz_and we will help you catch it.

SEEK WEEDS AND TERMINATE

At this time of year the bright scarlet flowers of Chilean flame creeper can be seen, often high in the tree canopy and very visible in the landscape.



This invasive vine produces dark blue berries that can be spread considerable distances by birds. As a result the vine has found its way into a few areas of native forest on the Otago Peninsula, where it forms a dense curtain that smothers trees, shrubs and ferns.

Chilean flame creeper dies back each winter and in spring re sprouts from underground roots. The slender stems climb rapidly by mean of curling tendrils and have 5-6 fingered soft, green leaves. This pest plant can be very difficult to remove from an area once it is established.

Fortunately, Chilean flame creeper is not common on the Otago Peninsula. We are working to control existing vines and, most importantly, trying to prevent new infestations from establishing.

The 2021 Real Estate Market

What's the best month of the year to list your property?

The property market is active again after the Christmas break, and February is likely the best month to list your property this year, says Century 21 New Zealand owner Derryn Mayne. "Those contemplating listing a property would be wiser to act sooner rather than later," Mayne said.

The realtor boss's comment comes as the ReserveBankofNewZealand(RBNZ)reviews a public consultation on its plan to reinstate loan-to-value ratios (LVRs) this year.

Last year, the RBNZ temporarily removed LVR restrictions in response to the first COVID-19 lockdown. Lower deposit requirements have since contributed to a surge in buyers and house prices. Experts predict it will see 20% minimum deposit requirements for owner-occupiers, and possibly even 40% for property investors. With property investors now making up around 27% of all buyers, Mayne believes putting the brakes on them will have a demonstrable impact, as has been the case in the past.

It took many of them out of the market and helped cool the jets somewhat. Combined with major tenancy law changes taking effect on February 11, I think we'll soon see many Kiwis pull back from buying a residential investment property," she said.

Mayne highlighted the strong demand due to record-low interest rates and fewer properties available for sale.

One thing is definitely looking likely: February is set to be the last month that many first-home purchasers and property investors can get into the market with a smaller deposit.

Note to prospective sellers: Don't miss out on these highly motivated buyers.
