Sharing the joint footpath/ cycle path

It has been a long wait with much unavoidable disruption but the major part of the Portobello Road improvement is completed. We owe a big thanks to the contractors who have done a wonderful job. Now we have a great path to share!

Over the past year the joint cycle/footpath has been well used and is getting more and more popular. Unfortunately, it has also created some issues for users. I walk on the path daily, talk to many other pedestrians, and there is one major topic of conversation (apart from the weather) "cyclists". We all appreciate the considerate cyclists who warn of their approach (bell or voice), slow down and carefully pass us pedestrians. In reality the path is on the narrow side to accommodate cyclists and pedestrians but I can't see it being widened in the near future - so we have to learn to share it, respectfully.

Sadly, there is a problem with a fair proportion of cyclists who seem to think they have sole right of use. So, just a reminder of cyclist (and e scooter) responsibilities taken from the NZ Transport Authority code for cyclists.

- Pass other people with patience and care.
- On shared paths, use slower speeds and give way to slower users.
- Pass other people with at least a metre gap to avoid startling them.
- Let pedestrians know you are approaching by politely calling out or ringing a bell well in advance, especially if they have not seen you.
- Where possible, ride on the left and pass on your right.

There is some debate about appropriate speeds on shared paths. E scooters and cycles are capable of speeds that can cause substantial damage to a pedestrian, especially an older person. Just today I clocked an e scooter travelling at over 40kph on the shared path. That seems irresponsible. In the vicinity of pedestrians 10kph might be too fast. If you don't think so, ask a cycling friend to run into you unexpectedly at that speed!

Remember, if you want to go fast and practice for the tour of Southland or even just to exceed your personal best, please use the cycle path at the edge of the road.

The problem is worse on a weekend so I suspect local peninsula-living cyclists are less of a problem than those coming in from town. So, spread the word and keep us all safe.

Despite all the challenges of 2020. possum control was OTAGO PENINSULA most successful and BODIVERSIT possum numbers on the northern areas of the peninsula are now very low. Our goal to June



2021 is to establish and maintain a network of traps on northern areas of the peninsula to catch the remaining possums and demonstrate that possums have been eradicated from these areas. Operations will then switch to the eradication of possums from the rest of the Peninsula.

Over February and March possums will be busy consuming Karaka, Mahoe, Rata flowers and leaves, and Miro berries. Orchard fruits are also on the menu, as is blackberry, rose hips, grass, fungi and crunchy critters, like insects and snails. Young possums (joeys) will be leaving their mothers and moving about to establish their own territories, which may well be in your back yard. If you notice that a possum is eating your fruit or roses please report it at possums@opbg.nz and we will help you catch it.

SEEK WEEDS AND TERMINATE

At this time of year the bright scarlet flowers of Chilean flame creeper can be seen, often high in the tree canopy and very visible in the landscape.

This invasive vine produces dark blue berries that can be spread considerable distances by birds. As a result the vine has found its way into a few areas of native forest on the Otago Peninsula, where it forms a dense curtain that smothers trees, shrubs and ferns.

Chilean flame creeper dies back each winter and in spring re sprouts from underground roots. The slender stems climb rapidly by mean of curling tendrils and have 5-6 fingered soft, green leaves. This pest plant can be very difficult to remove from an area once it is established.

Fortunately, Chilean flame creeper is not common on the Otago Peninsula. We are working to control existing vines and, most importantly, trying to prevent new infestations from establishing.

I hope you have all had a relaxing break and are refreshed and ready to face 2021.

With our children all back at school it's a good time to touch on our road safety around the schools especially at drop off and pick up times. Please take extra care on our roads and school carparks at these times. Our little ones don't think like us and can pop out from unexpected places. The roadworks at Greenacres Street in Macandrew Bay make things a lot busier and with so much going on you need to be on the ball.

You may be aware that over Waitangi weekend (Friday night) some people took it upon themselves to party in the Albatross Colony carpark and for reasons beyond belief decided to run over many of our red billed gulls. Approximately 30 have been barbarically killed and fences/rails have also been damaged on top of this. Words cannot describe this abhorrent behaviour. If you know anything about this or the people involved (I'm sure someone does) then do the right thing and come forward. It appears there were two cars and a 4wheel motorbike involved. I am still getting reports of bad driving on the low road. Was disappointing to clock one person at 93kmph in the 70kmph zone between Dunedin and Macandrew Bay last week. I offer no apologies if you get a speeding ticket as I have been banging on about this since my arrival nearly 3 years ago. It is up to you guys as the individual drivers to take responsibility, please slow down, buckle up and don't get distracted. One split second could change family lives forever.

FROM SHUKURU MUNRO AND FAMILY February 2021 Update for the Kilema Primary School Fundraiser

Fundraising for the children of Kilema Primary School is a powerful way to help the 1,000 or more pupils at the school to get an education.

We are very grateful to the local community and some businesses for their generous contributions but there is still a little way to go on some things. We still need 470 backpacks and 425 drink bottles to make sure that each child has one. A further 250 1B5s (just 28c each at Warehouse Stationary), and 250 pencils (\$4 for 10), to meet our original goals. Other items, such as 3B1 notebooks, pencil sharpeners, rubbers and coloured pencils would be very welcome.

Most of the families of these children cannot afford the school equipment which has been so generously donated by you and others. Every donation, no matter how small has been much appreciated. So far, we have reached 70% of our target in goods and cash.

We are now raising funds to finance the shipping of a container load of school equipment to Tanzania.
