Otago Peninsula Community Board

We still seem to be managing some pretty decent weather, even though we are nearly half way through May. Some recent rain was welcome, but the ground is still parched and we could do with some more.

PENINSULA CONNECTION – PORTOBELLO

What can I say about the Portobello section of the project apart from the fact that the announcement by Council that it won't be coming through the cutting by Portobello School until 2028 is a bitter disappointment.

To say that the Board was gobsmacked is an understatement, especially after years of consultation and public promises. I'm very proud of Emily Larkins, Ruth Faulkner and the kids from the school for fronting up to the recent DCC Annual Plan

and telling councillors what a poor decision this is for our community. Well done. There is some indication that the work beginning in June will include a compromise for school access, but the Board has not seen any detail around this. I think the most surprising thing is that the way the Council have worded the change, they don't think that Portobello School is part of the boundary of the township, very strange indeed. The fight hasn't stopped though and the community can help by contacting Councillors and letters to the editor explaining why this is such a poor decision.

SPEED LIMITS ON THE OTAGO PENINSULA

If there has been one issue that has seen my phone and email running red hot it has been the implementation of the 40km/h areas on the Otago Peninsula. What a confusing message this work has been in the community. The Board opposed the changes based on several factors, including:

- There have been no road fatalities on the Otago Peninsula in over 20 years
- Portobello road is significantly safer for all users since the widening
- Over 500 Peninsula people surveyed by the board opposed the changes



- The road widening will bring further planned traffic control measures reducing speed in Broad Bay, Portobello and Macandrew Bay
- The plan was inconsistent with other areas of the city

I don't think anyone could argue that within well defined residential areas, 40km/h is appropriate. However, the City Council has not looked closely enough at the scale and positioning of the areas so that traffic flow is efficient while keeping residential areas safe. We've now ended up with extra kilometres of unnecessary 40km/h areas where there

> is no density of people or houses. It is the Board's belief that we need the Peninsula to rally together and fight these changes back into some form of rational thinking, including contacting Councillors and writing letters to the editor explaining why this is such a poor decision and how it affects the community in a negative

manner. Remember too, this year is a Local Government election year, so it's a good time to consider where you may place your votes in October.

There are a lot of good websites that educate around this type of thing. They shouldn't be telling anyone they don't know their name, age, location, school or any other personal information. They shouldn't be seeing stuff that's rated above their age group. Just something to think about.

Thank you to all of the organisers of the ANZAC Service. I must say the intimacy and day as a whole really sends a shiver down the spin. Jo and I really enjoyed sharing the morning with those that attended.

claim that they have an exemption from doing so. If you do have an exemption, make sure you carry it with you and are able to produce it if asked. It is an offence not to wear one when required and you don't have the appropriate documentation to say this. In short, please be respectful to our shop owners and do the right thing.

> The changes are here in relation to the new speeds around the area. I hear that there is a lot of discussion around these and many unsatisfied people. All I ask is that you please abide by them as most of

you are already doing. If that means leaving a bit earlier, then this is what we must do. It is not an excuse (which I have had) that you didn't see them.

With winter approaching one thing to remember is to please put away your firewood as soon as you get it. It's just too tempting for some people to let you pay for their wood and keep them warm. Out of sight, out of mind is the best option here.

Remember if something is happening now and requires immediate police attendance, call **111**. If something has already happened and is not so urgent call **105** to make a report.

Until next time, take care of one another and remember my door is always open for advice or just for a cuppa and a chat.

Peninsula Connection update from DCC

NEXT STAGE OF PENINSULA CONNECTION STARTING SOON

Work on the next stage of the Peninsula Connection project begins in June. This work is an important milestone in the project, seeing a continuous shared path and safety upgrade between Portobello and the city, but it will mean more disruption for Peninsula residents.

The upcoming work will be done at two sites at the same time. One site is in Portobello (on Portobello Road from Coronation Hall to Allans Beach Road). The other is between Broad Bay and Turnbulls Bay (Sandpiper Street to Solar Terrace). Details of the works are below.

Preparation of the sites will start over the next few weeks. The main work will begin around the middle of June and take about a year. continued ...

Portobello Road will often be restricted to one lane in the worksites, and traffic will be managed with stop/go signs or traffic lights. Some road closures and detours via Highcliff Road may be required.

THE PENINSULA CONNECTION PROJECT

The aim of the Peninsula Connection project is to make Portobello and Harington Point roads safer and more appealing for everyone who uses them, and to increase resilience in the face of rising sea levels.

Broad Bay to Turnbulls Bay

- Roads widened and a shared path constructed along the inland portion of Portobello Road between Broad Bay and Turnbulls Bay
- Three retaining walls built to support the surrounding ground and reduce the likelihood of slips when the road is widened
- Emergency work to replace the partially collapsed culvert at Turnbulls Bay

Portobello

- Construction of a shared path and safer crossing points for cyclists and pedestrians
- Raised speed tables to keep traffic speeds down
- Construction of median islands and a roundabout to provide more separation between traffic at the intersection of Hereweka Street and Portobello, Harington Point, Highcliff and Hatchery roads
- Upgraded pedestrian access from Allans Beach Road to Portobello School
- Angled parking in front of the Portobello Store maintained
- Landscaping around the new seating area once the roading improvements are complete



We are excited to learn that all borders will finally be open to international visitors. This will make a big difference to all of us on the Peninsula. The extra income we receive from these guests helps in ways that are often forgotten about, but for Larnach Castle it means we can keep on with the ongoing restoration of the Castle. For the wildlife attractions, it helps the conservation of our fauna and the Peninsula bed and breakfasts will start to get busier.

We probably won't see it revert to the levels of 2019, but there will be a gradual increase of visitors.

Here at Larnach Castle we would never have

survived the last two years without the support of New Zealanders, and especially our Dunedin 'Loyal Locals'. You have been amazing. We love seeing you come and enjoy a coffee or a stroll in the garden, you have kept us going and we won't forget that. Still touching on ANZAC here are some sobering facts about our local soldiers.

Ex-pupils from Sandymount School who served overseas: 44 men served in WW1 (1914-1918) with seven killed. Several families, such as the Robertson and Weir family, had seven sons go overseas - three of the seven never

returned. In WW2, 14 men (four

Ex-pupils from Hoopers Inlet School who were involved in

overseas campaigns were: two Forsyth brothers who fought in the Boer War (1899-1902 in South Africa) and in WW1, 27 served overseas with six in Camp. Of the 27 who served overseas, five were Clearwaters, four Dicks and four Dicksons - (two Dickson brothers were killed). Three Dick boys were also in Camp. We have no record of who served from the district in WW2.

Kia ora koutou,

In the past few months we have farewelled former Keeper, Meghan Hughes and her whānau, and welcomed Floris

(Flo) Wouters as relieving Keeper. Flo has been one of our regular volunteers over the past few years and has been using his enthusiasm, energy and expertise to help us with improvements to the Keepers Cottage, as well as establishing a new composting system, improving the soil through a rotational grazing system of the islands' sheep, and supporting our mahi in the Reserve. We are also pleased to announce we have appointed Olivia (Liv) Taylor-Peebles

as our new permanent Keeper who will start in late

May. Liv has a background in science communication and environmental management and we look forward to welcoming her.

The past few months have remained quieter with cancellations of Lodge bookings due to the COVID-19 outbreak, although many day visitors have come to experience the island thanks to Rachel from Port-To-Port Cruises and Wildlife Tours ferry trips and island Treasure

Hunts which were also part of the Wild Dunedin Festival in the Easter school holidays.

Groups who have enjoyed some 'island time' and volunteering have included students from Logan Park High School, Elmgrove School, Bayfield High School, Waitaki Girls High School, Roxburgh Area School, Mackenzie College, & Twizel Area School, some of whom attended the education programme at the Marine Studies Centre, students from the School of Physical Education, Sports & Exercise Science (University of Otago), Caroline Freeman College, Purākaunui School, Unicrew Volunteers Otago, and the Dunedin Photographic Society, as well as a small number of family groups, and birthday celebrations.

Thanks to all our volunteers and Community members for their efforts on and off the island over the last few months. Mahi has included releasing and mulching seedlings, autumn bird counts, skink surveys, monitoring predator

seaweed, moving scaffolding, and preparing the Keepers Cottage ready for carpet installation. We are grateful to the NZ Lottery Community Grant which fully covers our Keepers salary this year, the Dunedin City Council for subsidising boat transfers for volunteers helping with ecological projects in April, and Carpet Court for their generous offer to supply and

Royal Albatross Centre

The last month of Autumn at the colony is a great time for albatross activity. The chicks are maybe 7 to 9 kilograms, looking like giant fluffballs. They are becoming more interested in the world around them and are starting to walk to investigate the things they have only looked at from afar.

There are 25 chicks in the colony, 4 of these visible out front of the Richdale Observatory. A desperate teenage bird might still be seen flying around without any friends, and of course 50 adult birds returning every 1 to 3 days to feed their chicks.

Not wanting to start any rumours, but the image is of a chick beside the disappearing gun, and sleeping standing up! Is this a trick they have learnt from the resident donkeys on the peninsula or their other feathered friends? Does this also mean they can sleep while they are flying?

To be scientific, many bird species are observed sleeping standing up, including ducks, geese, cranes and flamingos. The utilisation of the flexor tendon being tightened in the back of the legs in birds is an involuntary reflex, as long as the bird remains stationary it can sleep standing up.

In an albatross however, the dynamic soaring flight technique is facilitated through the same process of tightening the flexor tendon in the wings! So, considering the same reflex action can be utilised in the legs as well as the wings, can they actually sleep while flying?



WORKING TOWARDS A PREDATOR FREE PENINSULA

There are 21,104 fewer possums on the peninsula since our project started. Together with the community we've caught

200 possums since the beginning of this year. And we've now got a whopping 1,132 traps on the ground!

The OPBG team along with many community members are working hard to eradicate possums. We are seeing an increasing number of

native birds as a result and the native bush is also looking very healthy. We are on the right track for increased biodiversity on the peninsula.

There has been an increased number of road kills and sightings/sounds over the last month, and this is due to the current mating season. Possums like to use human pathways to move around to find mates, as it requires less effort. This is happening more because there are less possums, so they need to travel further to find a mate. Thank you very much to those who have reported the sightings so we can respond by making sure there are traps

ready for when they stop and rest in a nearby habitat.

If you have heard or seen a possum, please get in contact by emailing or texting me, or else you can go to our website and click on the "report a possum" button. If you are wanting a trap, please also get in touch.

If you have the startlingly pretty pink flowers of the Banana Passionfruit (BPF) vine in your garden or on your landholding, it's a safe bet you also have rats.



Here's an enormous rat's nest we discovered recently in the large root system of a BPF vine near Portobello.

And that rat's nest is full of chewed and half chewed yellow BPF fruit. Did you know that Banana Passionfruit fruits right through winter? It's a hugely valuable food source for rats enabling them to breed year round. So if you have BPF on your property - you have prime rat real estate.
