Portobello School

Tēnā koutou,

This term at Portobello School, we were nominated for our enviro projects at the Keep Dunedin Beautiful Awards where we received a commendation. We continued on our projects with planting at Seaton's Bush. Many thanks to Paula and Brendon Cross for hosting us onsite.

Following on from our original Kaitiaki Domain and awa experience, we extended upon learning. The Marine Studies Centre demonstrated a squid



dissection, much to the delight from some tamariki and dismay of others! We also saw new invertebrate species in the stream. Paula from the Biodiversity Group gave us a talk about predators and trapping on the Peninsula. Many thanks to Jenni Upton who co-ordinates the DCC Enviro schools programme and those involved for making this another successful and enjoyable morning.

Our Seniors have travelled to Allan's Beach to observe penguin activity there. They then come back to school and download data which is shared with Dr Hiltrun Ratz. To coincide with localised experiences, we remain actively involved with Sally Carson's Under the Wharf Project, looking at changes in our ocean and marine environment.

The Peninsula Art Exhibition was held at Bayfield High School. Ethan Kelly received first place for his Tiriti o Waitangi entry, and Wilson Murphy highly commended for his Ruaumoko volcano artwork.

Early September our Spring breakfast was a springboard toward community consultation around a refresh of our

school values. It was good to receive both whānau and student input. September also saw some brave competitors enter into the Ariki Cup and our cross country at school.

We are also in the early phases of introducing a School Council and leadership roles within our kura. Students had to write a letter of application and further interview for leadership responsibilities.

The exterior paintwork of our school is near completion and while it has been well overdue, we are sure that the results will be worth the wait. Another project worth mentioning is our retaining wall redesign, which has taken a great length of time because of the paperwork, planning and discussion involved. We are happy to say that consent has been applied for and the construction company selected. It is anticipated to begin in the new year.

Portobello Volunteer Fire Brigade

Hi. My name is Jamie Ramsay and this is my first contribution to our community newsletter as the Chief of the Portobello Brigade. First off, I would like to thank Greg Dickson for all his

guidance and wisdom as my chief and his continued support from his new role as our deputy chief.

Now that we are in daylight saving time it is a good time to check that all our smoke alarms are working. It has been proven that 'working smoke alarms' have saved many lives in NZ, so it is important that they are maintained correctly.

- Fire and Emergency recommends Photoelectric smoke alarms with a long-life battery.
- If you have a smoke alarm with a replaceable battery, change the battery annually.

- Keep your smoke alarm clean and free from dust and spider webs. Use a duster or vacuum cleaner to remove dust.
- · Test your smoke alarm. Press the test button, if it's working

you will hear a loud beep or a series of beeps. A broom handle is useful if the smoke alarm is hard to reach.

• Replace smoke alarms after 10 years.

Otago Peninsula Museum



Spring is upon us and the daffodils at the Museum have put on a real show and seem to multiply each year.

In July we had a special visit from the Henaghan family who were visiting from the isolated West Coast of Ireland. They were part of the Irish Rugby Supporters Tour who were here for the Rugby tests between our two nations. Their family ancestors, Patrick and Ann Heneghan, came out on



the ship Salisbury in 1874 arriving in Wellington. They made their way south and Patrick went to Cape Saunders as the Assistant Lighthouse Keeper. Their two oldest children tragically died at Cape Saunders. They had four more children - three girls (who never married) and one son

(William Thomas) who was born on Dog Island. William was a well known Dunedin dental surgeon.

The Lighthouses, all in the South Island except Pencarrow, that Patrick was stationed at were:

- Pencarrow
- · The Brothers
- · Puysegur Point
- Cape Saunders (in 1883 two children died at Cape Saunders; Ellen and Thomas)
- Dog Island William Thomas was born on Dog Island (1885)
- Moeraki 5 years
- · St Stephens Island 5 years
- Waipapa Point 1901
- Taiaroa Head 3 years
- · Godley Head, Lyttelton 4 years
- The Nuggets his last posting. He was 38 years in the service and one of the longest serving.

The Cape Saunders Lighthouse first light shone in January 1880.

Adults \$2 and children are free. The grounds are a lovely sheltered spot to have a picnic at any time. The Museum does not have to be open to visit the grounds and there are some outside exhibits to look at.

Portobello Public Library

New books are added to the Library regularly and if there is anything you would particularly like to read then ask Dot, our Librarian, and she will see if she can get it. The following is a book review from one of our recent purchases.

The Pull of the Stars by Emma Donoghue.



The story takes place in a Dublin maternity ward when the country was in midst of the Spanish flu epidemic in 1918, as well as the end the of WW1. The book details three days in the life and work of Julia, a nurse in the "infected" maternity ward, where expectant mothers who come down with flu are quarantined together. Together with Dr

Kathleen Lynn and volunteer helper Bridie Sweeney, Julia brings new life into the world as well as losing patients to the pandemic. This is a story of hope and survival against the odds, as well as being a commentary on social dynamics of the time, including the power of the Church. As a nurse working in our current pandemic I found this book hard to put down. I can see much has changed, but not everything. The lack of staff, equipment and resources remains, but at least I don't have to make up my own IV fluids or donate my own blood at the bedside! I thoroughly recommend this book as an easy read which, although set in the past, has many modern connections.

The Portobello Public Library is open Thursdays and Sundays 11am - 1pm at the Portobello Hall.

Broad Bay Boating Club/Sailability Otago

Our future goal is to establish Broad Bay Boating Club (BBBC) as a hub of disability sailing in Otago Harbour, to provide access to safe sailing, and to enrich the lives of Dunedin people with an intellectual or physical disability. Through sailing we will enable them to experience adventure and freedom, encouraging mobility, self-confidence and pride through achievements on the water.

For the sailing days we use a fleet of specifically designed Hansa sailing dinghies. The events will be combined with other races and community sailings of BBBC, dependent on weather conditions and tides.

We are fundraising to purchase our own Hansa Boats as the present fleet has been generously loaned to us by the Hansa Association New Zealand.

Gosh, like many others my heart goes out to those people in the Ukraine. We are so fortunate for having such a wonderful country as ours. According to the latest statistics, New Zealand is the second safest place in the world behind Iceland. Considering Iceland's isolation, cold climate plus low population of around 370,000 I still believe Aotearoa New Zealand is the safest place in the world to raise a family. On that note, I am so grateful to all of the people who were responsible for caring for me when I suffered a cardiac arrest while "acting as a sick patient" for the medical students to practise their diagnostic skills on. Fortunately we were in the Frazer building at the time when this occurred and one of the Tutors who knew CPR managed to revive me. I was then rushed to the hospital

where I duly recovered. I now sport a pacemaker plus defibrillator machine plugged into my heart and it's thanks to them that I can now share this information with you. I value every single day more than ever now and am learning to let my physical as well as emotional and mental bodies heal in their own good time, something I espouse to the students to whom I teach ancient Maori philosophy. I am referred to as a Kaiako - a teacher/learner. In the situation I am in now, I am a learner; learning to let my body heal itself. I am learning to be patient and trust the body's natural healing ability.

Plunket Home Help


Your Knowledge and Skills can Make a Difference

STOP (Save The Otago Peninsula)

With a great last minute effort, all 3,000 trees were planted by the end of September in the Hereweka Rotary Forest in the newly fenced second tributary of the Smiths Creek Catchment on the Hereweka Harbour Cone Block. Appreciative thanks to all of you who turned out to plant, and to those of you who contributed to the cost of those.

Vic is now busy making the 'Queen's seat' with a crown and the years of her life carved into the backrest. This will be placed on the steep track on the way up to this year's plantings from where you can rest and enjoy views of Hereweka and the Harbour. This will become an alternative hike to the popular Future Forest Walk in the first tributary.

One unusual gift of trees came from someone who,

after reading the interview with volunteer Vic Mills in the Sunday Times, was inspired to have 96 trees planted in memory of the late Queen Elizabeth. At the top of the "Queen's Grove" are Cabbage Trees and Pittosporums, with a strip of Kōwhai signifying the gold crown, a set of young Lancewood (spears) below that and then a range of native trees including some long lived podocarps such as Kahikatea down into the gully.



Volunteers are now turning their attention to releasing trees planted in previous years to maximise their survival rate. Regular working bees with any necessary tools provided, meet at the end of Bacon St in Turnbulls Bay (the next bay past Broad Bay) every Tuesday and Sunday at 9.30am.

Invasive Weeds Update from SWAT

September is the time of year when the SWAT team is on the lookout for bright orange trees and shrubs. The orange flowers of the pest plant Darwin's barberry are a beautiful colour, hence its planting in gardens.

However the orange flowers become dark blue berries, loved by the birds, and so the seeds are dispersed far and wide.

But Darwin's barberry is a tough customer that can invade our bush outcompeting native plants or grow happily in a grazed paddock, as in the photo below. Note this particular tree was eradicated a few years ago.

Recent findings of isolated shrubs of this pest plant in the Sandymount Reserve is worrying. SWAT has been working





on several Pukehiki properties to get rid of Darwin's barberry and we are very grateful to all landowners who allow us access.

Other Pukehiki landowners are contacting us to report Darwin's barberry and locals are on the look out when out and about in the coastal shrublands at Sandymount and Boulder Beach. SWAT would appreciate any new sightings.

Good surveillance is key to spotting a new pest plant before it has a chance to spread, so thanks to everyone who is helping with this initiative to reduce Darwin's barberry on Otago Peninsula.

Quarantine Island/Kamau Taurua Community Inc.

Kia ora koutou,

Liv Taylor-Peebles, our motu Keeper has been kept busy despite a relatively quiet time for Lodge guests and a mixture of weather, including some snow!

However, a number of groups have enjoyed some 'island time' and mahi over the past few months, including day visits from the Rotary Club of Dunedin South. Some stayed for one or two nights, including groups from the University of Otago Students for Environmental Action (S.E.A), Caroline Freeman College, Arana College and Salmond College and whānau or friends simply enjoyed a retreat to reconnect with each other or celebrate a birthday. Students from St. Kevin's College, Oamaru, have also

stayed whilst attending the education programme at the Marine Studies Centre. Ōtepoti Dunedin artists Lynn Taylor, Marion Wassenaar and Kiri Mitchell returned for a nights stay to continue their print-making project.

On 14th August a few Community members spent the afternoon on the motu joined by Nadia Wesley-Smith and whānau, Paulette Tamiti-Eliffe and Tumai Cassidy, Te Rūnanga o Ōtākou, and Aurora Energy representatives Amy Owen, Grace Pickering, and Mark Pratt. This visit was part of planning for the 'Aurora Legacy Project' and planting event following the removal of power lines and pylons from the island, Portobello and Koputai/Port Chalmers last September. Jim Fyfe led the group on a walk to the former pylon sites and a few significant places and each shared stories and korero in the sunshine. At each stopping place Pīwakawaka/Fantails graced our presence, Korimako/Bellbirds feasted on native flowering Kōwhai in the regenerating bush planted by the Community over the years, and Karoro/Black-backed gulls and Tarāpunga/Redbilled gulls freely soared above us where the power lines and pylons used to be.

Late September and early October has been a big planting time on the motu with the Aurora Energy Planting Days held on 15th and 16th September. As part of the Aurora Legacy Project, Quarantine Island/Kamau Taurua Community Inc., the Aurora Harbour Crossing team, and the wider community on both sides of the harbour enjoyed a day or two of planting mahi, connecting and

reconnecting with others and with the motu. We are hugely grateful for all the mahi and the contributions by the Aurora team over the past year or so, and we look forward to an ongoing relationship through the Legacy Project and beyond.

On our Community Welcome Day's we have seen a number of new and returning visitors, community members and volunteers from both

sides of the Harbour. Thanks to all our volunteers and community members for their efforts on and off the island over the last few months. Mahi has included moving a new window and door from Back Beach, Port Chalmers to the island, and installing them, removing rubbish and recycling, doing other maintenance to the Cottage and Lodge, installing a fire-fighting valve to one of the water tanks near to the buildings, helping with the 'Great Big Spring Clean' of the Lodge, moving the heihei house, planting, releasing and mulching seedlings, weed control, monitoring predator traps and tracking tunnels, helping with the first Spring bird count, collecting and sorting beach litter for the Sustainable Coastline Litter Intelligence survey, and guiding.

We are grateful to Otago Regional Council ECO Fund, Aurora Energy, Rotary Club of Dunedin South for recent funds to help us to continue our regeneration project involving the wider community, Paul Clements for all his mahi on the Cottage upgrades, and general maintenance, and Port-To-Port Cruises and Wildlife Tours, and East Coast Charters who have provided boat transfers.

Thank you very much to all who completed the recent survey on rabbits and stoats. The feedback is excellent and has given us a great insight to the current work and

challenges within other pest species. We are having a community meeting to discuss and present the findings as well as what involvement OPBG have regarding this work. The community meetings will be held at Portobello School on November the 28th at 7.30pm, and Macandrew Bay School on Thursday December the 1st at 7.30pm.

We continue to work hard to eradicate the brushtail possum. Thank you to the community for allowing us onto your properties, to residents that set traps and to all the volunteers doing trap lines. The tally is sitting at 22,108 possums and counting. Recently we recorded

the 1000th community trap in circulation. Possums are moving around now, especially young males looking for females, so thank you to all those that are reporting

> sightings and to those keeping fresh bait in your traps. The recent sign installed on Vauxhall Yacht Club is a valuable reminder about what we are trying to achieve. Thank you to the Vauxhall Yacht Club and all others involved in this work.

I would like to welcome our two new staff to the operations team-Lou Flight and Lisa Campbell. They are a wonderful addition to the team and have taken to the work very quickly, working towards our possum free zone.

100 years ago this month...

Ten moa skeletons made their way from Harwood to the Otago Museum.

> — Northern Advocate, 4 October 1922 (via Papers Past)

University The Otago Museum (states the "Otago Daily Times") has received as a gift from Miss L. A. Harwood, ten partially complete moa skeletons, found in the earlier years of the Otago settlement on the Lower Portobello sandhilis by the late Mr O. Harwood. Though imperfect, skeletons afford important evidence as to the characteristics of the different species of mon that in ancient times inhabited the district about Dunedin. The museum has acquired from neighbourhood a large greenstone, mottled and marked in a most unusual manner.
